NALZS Happenings



A Note From the Executive Director

While studies on the topic are not always readily available to the public due to being published in scientific conference proceedings, a few have been published to the public and document the positive effects of zoo visits on people's health.

NALZS recently put together its own analysis on the impact of zoos in regard to quality of life, and we're excited to share the highlights with you. Since we're working to create a modern zoo and aquarium, we looked at the quality of life benefits one would offer to individuals and the community. And there are plenty! Here are a few we found to have the greatest impact:

- Opportunities for imaginative, cultural, historical, and physical exploration
- Blending of plants, animals, and other biodiversity to offer everyone daily interaction and connection with the natural world
- Stewardship of our natural resources; preservation of Earth's flora and fauna; and prevention and removal of pollution

In this edition of NALZS News, we have an article that delves deeper into the valuable information from this analysis, and I encourage you to check it out.

I also want to thank everyone for their continued support. We're excited about the NALZS programs and events coming up in 2023, and will continue to work toward "A Zoo For You, North Alabama."

What Does a Zoo Do for You?

If you're reading this newsletter, we're guessing you're a fan of visiting zoos and aquariums. But have you ever stopped to think, "What does a zoo do for you?" Well, we have some answers!

Since NALZS is striving to create a zoo and aquarium, but doesn't have one, we chose to look at what a Modern Zoo and Aquarium (Z&A) would offer in terms of quality-of-life benefits for individuals. And we're excited to share the highlights of this analysis with you. Keep reading to learn about all the benefits Z&As bring to to individuals and families, on up to the world at large.

What Is 'Quality of Life?'

Before we get to the benefits, let's talk about what quality of life is anyway. While the definitions vary, one of the most accepted ones comes from the World Health Organization. It defines quality of life as "an individual's perception of their position in life in the context of the culture and value systems in which they live and in relation to their goals, expectations, standards and concerns." What's important to remember from this definition is that quality of life is a subjective measure of one's well-being.

The 7 Quality of Life Domains and How Zoos Measure Up

We chose seven quality-of-life categories for our analysis. and we cover each of them in their own section below. Within each category we list three quality-of-life benefits, plus we measure each in terms of a Z&A's Impact (indicated with an "I") and Influence and Reach

(Indicated with an "R"). Impact measurements range from 1 star (negligible) to 5 stars (stratospheric). Influence and Reach, on the other hand, start at individuals and go all the way up to the world itself. (You can see the full list of measurements in the pull-out box at right.)

In each section, you'll also see an asterisk (*) next to one of the benefits. In the paragraph below it, you can read about that benefit and how a Z&A contributes to fulfilling it.

Basics

Shelter: I = 1.5 stars; R = Area **Employment and Earnings:** I = 3 stars; R = World* Food and Clothing: I = 1.5 stars; R = Area

It's important for people to have access and the means to earn a fair living so they can meet the needs of themselves and loved ones. As it turns out, a significant cause of human-animal conflicts relates to the ability to provide a living via jobs such as farming, logging, and mining. Modern Z&As work to help minimize the effects causing human-animal conflicts related to these necessary jobs, as well as to find alternatives. And as members of their communities, they work to be responsible employers providing livable wages and benefits.

get there, Z&As can have other impacts on the health of the people who visit. Many studies, some of which include zoological facility settings, have concluded that interactions with animals improve anxiety, stress, depression, and other mental and emotional conditions. Other studies have shown that they also have the same effect on many animal residents of the Z&A.

Modern Z&As are often identified as being "living museums." Museums expose people to new things, which open our minds up to exploring more possibil-(Continued on Page 4)

ities and being more creative with the solutions to life's challenges. They also ground us with respect and admiration for the accomplishments of the past.

Movement

The Modern Z&A has great appreciation for personal vehicle transportation as beneficiaries. and implements it on a small scale within the Z&A. Z&As work with public officials and governments improve roads and routes around the Z&A for the benefits of travelers, the community, and the environment.

Nature

Open Spaces: I = 4.5 stars; R = World Connection and Interaction: I = 5 stars; R = World* Sustaining the Environment: I = 5 stars; R = World

Most Modern Z&As' stated core purpose is to facilitate that connection between people and the animals under their care. This also includes the natural habitats those species come from. The interaction with nature in the Z&A is what stimulates all the quality-of-life benefits for both visitor and resident.

Modern Z&As have a tremendous economic impact on their surrounding communities. They generate jobs and support local communities by attracting hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. The universal appeal Z&As have as a regional attraction means the effects reach

farther than just the local host city, too.

Research suggests

that individuals who feel a sense of security, belonging, and trust in their community have better health. Some of the ways this is achieved is through community groups, activities, and events, which Modern Z&As love to host. Other ways Z&As contribute to the sense of community is through their volunteer programs and the overall social aspect of seeing neighbors out doing a similar activity.
